Research Questions



2. How does The Discussion Project affect how students experience and learn from discussions in courses taught by instructors trained by The Discussion Project?





- Welcoming classroom environment
- Preparation

- Synchronous video conference discussion can be effective
- Asynchronous (written) discussion is challenging and has serious limitations

3. What are the best mechanisms to both scale The Discussion Project and extend it to other institutions of higher education with demographically different students than UW-Madison (the institution in which it was developed)?



Discussion Self-Report

Research indicates that students benefit from classroom discussion in terms of engagement and learning of course content and skills. However, in many college classrooms, most of the speaking / talk is instructor talk and there's limited discussion. Norms

The Discussion Project's Definition of Discussion



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Discussion is <u>focused inquiry</u> through <u>speaking &</u> <u>listening</u> that is <u>purposeful</u>, <u>broadly</u> <u>collaborative</u>, and that leads to <u>deeper</u> <u>understanding</u> through <u>analysis of</u> <u>different perspectives</u>.
