BRIAN DEITH

During my tenure on the Districting and Representation Committee, I've created a website for the committee. This website allows people to look up their rep, get a list of members of a district and find out which district a person belongs to. In addition, the program that populates the database each month also sends lists of district members to the Secretary of the Academic Staff, who forwards each list to the appropriate representative.

While this allows the lists to get out, there are several complicating factors. In particular, email lists aren't always in the form preferred by certain email programs. The lists must pass through email gateways, which occasionally flag the list as spam (Some spam filters look at the number of email addresses in the message, and don't restrict the search to just the headers.) For this reason, I'd like to continue to work on alternate ways of disseminating lists to representatives. I'm currently investigating web based authentication for representatives as a way they can download lists on demand - or even have the lists sent directly to the rep, rather than through the secretary's office as is currently done.

I hope to have the opportunity to continue serving the academic staff community as I have done in the past.
