LECTURES COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2009-2010

Role of the Committee

The Lectures Committee (www.secfac.wisc.edu/lectures/lectcomm/) supports departments, academic programs and student organizations that bring distinguished lecturers to the UW-Madison campus. These university-wide lectures are intended to enrich the general intellectual and cultural life of the university community. The committee itself does not initiate lecture arrangements. Rather, it receives and acts on requests from eligible university groups that are interested in inviting outstanding speakers to the campus.

Supported Lectures

During the 2009-2010 academic year, the committee received a total of 67 applications for lecture support, 65 of which were supported, 1 was denied and 1 was canceled. Appendix A presents information for each supported lecture; lectures are listed alphabetically by the lecture's primary sponsoring unit.

The 65 supported applications drew a combined reported attendance of 5,872 persons, with a mean of 89 attendees per lecture. Lectures were sponsored by a total of 56 different campus units. The typical lecture had 1 to 5 co-sponsoring units, in addition to the primary sponsor.

The committee's total expenditures for the year were \$60,775.42. Of this sum, \$58,813.81 (97%) was paid directly to lecturers as honoraria or to reimburse travel and per diem expenses, and \$1,961.61 (3%) paid for lecture administrative costs (i.e., postage, printing and poster distribution).

Comparisons with Recent Years

The table below compares committee activity from the most recent five years. The number of applications received and supported was down by 6 from the previous 2008-2009 year, 1 lecture was denied and 1 lecture withdrew in 2009-2010. The highest level of applications received in the past five years was in 2006-2007 when the level was 95. The mean reported lecture attendance was up slightly from recent years (except for 2007-08). The mean lecture cost remained at historical levels.

Recognition of Support

We gratefully acknowledge sources of financial support for university-wide lectures. For direct funding of lectures, the Anonymous Fund provided \$18,280.06; the Kemper K. Knapp Bequest provided \$19,355.65. The Office of the Chancellor provided from the General University Fund \$21,178.10 for direct funding of lectures and \$1,961.61 for lecture administrative costs.

Lastly, the committee continues to welcome suggestions regarding use of the William K. Fitch Fund, which is available "to bring to Madison prominent business people to give lectures on the American free-enterprise system." None of the committee's supported lectures during 2009-2010 met the criteria necessary to draw from this fund. The balance of this fund continues to accrue; the market value at the end of the 2009-2010 academic year was \$171,264.53.
